### POSSIBLE PROJECTS...

Many garden clubs will begin 2025 by giving donations to non-profit organizations or to funds of AFGC. Most clubs donate funds to help with projects that are an interest to their members. Many clubs send their donations to AFGC during Jan. and Feb. It's just a good time to continue the joy of giving that we experienced during the Christmas season.

Review the possibilities below...

## Non-profits

**AR Nature Conservancy**: Restores the lands and waters of Arkansas.

**Habitat for Humanity**: The goal is to enhance the environment with native trees, shrubs, plants, and flowers.

Heifer International: Empowers families worldwide to turn hunger and poverty into hope and prosperity.

**NGC Natural Disasters Fund**: Grants to garden clubs for help to replant public areas damaged by natural disasters.

**NGC Plant-a-Tree**: For many years, National Garden Clubs, Inc. and the USDA Forest Service have maintained a partnership sustaining our national forests through the Plant-A-Tree program. Plant-A-Tree, formerly known as Penny Pines, is a reforestation and forest education program.

NGC Plant America: Grants awarded to garden clubs to help with community projects they are involved in.

Garvan Woodland Gardens: Located in Hot Springs. Provides learning opportunities.

### **AFGC Funds**

**Blue Star Memorial Program:** Your donation to AFGC helps garden clubs in our state place markers or refurbish them at welcome signs, National cemeteries, parks, and veteran's facilities.

**Book of Remembrance**: With a donation of at least \$10 a person's name is placed in the book of Remembrance. All donations go into the Scholarship fund of AFGC.

Flower Show Fund: This is helpful in funding a state flower show.

**Flower Show School Fund**: This is used to fund AFGC Flower Show Schools. Schools prepare our members to serve as NGC Accredited Judges. Four courses are required.

**Scholarship Fund of AFGC**: Each year we try to award at least one college student a \$2,000.scholarship depending on available funds.

**Sponsor an AFGC Award for adults or youth.** This is a great way to encourage clubs and our youth to show more interests in awards and contests.

**Become a Life Member of AFGC, SCR, and/or NGC**: Become an AFGC Life Member for \$50, an SCR membership is \$50 +\$5 for a pin, and NGC is \$200.

# Restoring a Butchered Crepe Myrtle

If you've beheaded a big crepe myrtle to within a few feet of the ground, there's only one solution. Cut the sorry plant completely to the ground. It will grow back very quickly. The next winter, select three to five well-spaced trunks, and cut off any others at ground level. Follow the instructions on how to prune a crepe myrtle, and you'll have an attractive tree within five years.

But maybe your sin wasn't so acute. You've only rounded off, or "hat-racked," your crepe myrtle, cutting back all of its main branches to about the same height. In this case, follow our four-step process to get beautiful plants.

- 1. Examine the tops of the stumps you have left. If there are knuckled knobs, cut them off.
- 2. Within weeks, bunches of thin shoots will grow from the cut ends of the stumps. Prune off all but a couple that you will let grow.
- 3. Keep doing this every spring for the next three years. Don't let any new shoots grow from the ends of the stumps next to the ones you saved.
- 4. Train the saved shoots to grow up and out. Remove any side branches that grow from them towards the center of the tree. The saved shoots will become the new main trunks.

Eventually, your crepe myrtle will look beautiful again. Go and sin no more. —Southern Living


